

Professor David Hutchins OAM (1926-2019) was an equine veterinarian of renown. ### **Nerve Block Wetlab**

#### Presented by the University of Melbourne







Convened by Dr Hadley Willsallen BVSc, MANZCVSc, DACVS-LA

Registered Specialist in Equine Surgery, this excellent wetlab will be presented by a range of specialist demonstrators.

#### Lecture:

- Equine nerve block and joint injection technique descriptions, interpretation, misinterpretation, and what can go wrong?
- Perineural and joint injections of the fore and hindlimbs
- Now I can put a needle in it, what medication should I use?
- Diagnosis of wound communication with synovial structures and/or septic synovial cavities and how to manage in the field with lavage techniques and local antimicrobials

#### Wetlab:

Attendees will refresh and review perineural and intrasynovial diagnostic anaesthesia of the limb including considerations when deciding on what technique and local anaesthetic agent or intraarticular medication to use.

The wetlab will be very hands-on, working in pairs with a cadaver fore and hindlimb. There will be a high ratio of circulating specialists to allow plenty of opportunity to practice and master the injections and review anatomy. Synovial communication with wounds, identifying septic joints and lavage techniques in the field will be practiced. Collaborative and open discussions between instructors and attendees on clinical experiences and preferences will be encouraged.

## Keynote speakers





After graduation from the Autonomous University of Barcelona in 2007, Albert did an internship at the University of Guelph, Canada followed by a private practice internship at Rood and Riddle Equine Hospital in Kentucky. Albert moved to the University of California, Davis for his surgical training where he stayed and worked as an Equine Surgical Specialist for a further two years. After that, Albert moved to Australia in 2014 and worked at Camden Equine Centre, University of Sydney for almost 3 years before joining the University of Queensland. Albert is a specialist in equine surgery, and he became board certified by the American College of Veterinary Surgeons in February 2013.



#### **Alex Young**

Alex is a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Radiology and registered specialist in Veterinary Diagnostic Imaging having trained for 6 years at the University of California, Davis. She completed a rigorous 2 year fellowship in Large Animal Ultrasound during this time and although she is trained as a veterinary radiologist for all species, Alex's primary interest remains equine musculoskeletal imaging. Alex currently works part time as a Senior Lecturer in Veterinary Diagnostic Imaging at the University of Queensland and part time as a private consultant equine teleradiologist. She thoroughly enjoys training veterinary students and practitioners in various imaging techniques as well as the value of a multi-modality approach to the more challenging clinical cases.



#### **Andres Diaz Mendez**

Andrés is a lecturer at The University of Melbourne who earned his veterinary degree from the Universidad de La Salle in Bogotá, Colombia. After moving to Canada in 1999, he pursued his postgraduate education at the Ontario Veterinary College, University of Guelph, where he earned his MSc in clinical studies in 2006 working on equine respiratory viruses and a PhD in veterinary virology in 2012 focused on the picornavirus equine rhinitis A virus. Andrés then continued as a postdoctoral fellow at the Firestone Equine Respiratory Research Laboratory at the University of Guelph until his relocation to Melbourne in 2014.





#### **Angus McKinnon**

Angus graduated from Melbourne University Veterinary School.

After a short time in a mixed rural practice, he received an offer of a residency at the Ontario Veterinary College. As he was a slow learner, he was there for 5 years. That was followed by another 5 years at Colorado State University where he was fortunate enough to learn from the "the big three" in Equine Reproduction of Squires, Voss and Pickett.

After returning to Australia, he established the Goulburn Valley Equine Hospital with Jim Vasey. Recently the Hospital was sold to Melbourne University as part of their teaching program for students.

Having the students present all the time and being responsible for their practical training has been a rewarding experience for all of the staff at GVEH.

Along the way he has learnt and forgot quite a few things. He has written many journal articles and published a few books on equine reproduction and ultrasonography.

He never expected to be invited to speak again at Bain Fallon, not just because of bad behaviour but due to the frequency of previous invitations.

He feels it is a nice gesture to be invited again on the eve of what probably heralds his movement into full time farming and thus he has titled his talks "things I have learnt along the way".



#### **Brian Anderson**

- BVSc with distinction 1986 (Massey University, New Zealand), MVSc in Equine Pharmacology and internship in equine medicine and surgery 1989-1991 (Massey University New Zealand).
- Resident in Large Animal Surgery and MS degree 1991-1994 (University of Minnesota USA).
- Diplomate American College of Veterinary Surgeons 1996 in Large Animal Surgery.
- Lecturer and Senior Lecturer in Surgery 1994-2000 Massey University.
- Brian joined the Ballarat Veterinary Practice in September 2000 and became a partner in 2003.
- Specialist in Equine Surgery Victoria, Australia since 2009.

Brian has many years of experience in upper respiratory tract surgery of the horse. He co-authored the chapter on the Larynx in Auer and Stick: Equine Surgery 4th edition. He was the endoscopic consultant for New Zealand Bloodstock Ltd 1996-2000 and has researched, published and lectured on diseases and conditions of the upper respiratory tract nationally and internationally.





#### Chelsie Burden

Dr Burden graduated from Kansas State University College of Veterinary Medicine in 2011. She subsequently completed an internship at Oklahoma City Equine Clinic followed by a residency and master's degree at the Colorado State University Equine Reproduction laboratory. Dr. Burden became board-certified with the American College of Theriogenologists in 2015.

Dr Burden transitioned to Australia (Goulburn Valley Equine Hospital) following her residency. She continued transitioning between the southern and northern hemisphere breeding seasons working at Claiborne Farm in Kentucky, Haras Al Boraq in Morocco, and the University of Florida before settling in Australia in 2017. Dr Burden's interests focus on the problem broodmare and assisted reproductive technology in the mare.



#### **Ed Annand**

Ed has fourteen years equine practice experience including referral, first opinion, stud, and university-clinical-teaching in Australia (Qld, NSW, Vic) and UK. He holds post-graduate qualifications in Stud-Medicine/Reproduction, Equine Surgery and Veterinary Epidemiology. Since involvement in the first identification of Australian bat lyssavirus spillover to domestic mammalian species in 2013, he has led the 'Horses as Sentinels' research. The research hypothesised that some disease in horses consistent with HeV, but negative when tested, is due to infection with novel viruses that may similarly spill-over from flying-foxes posing potential zoonotic risk. This research recently identified a hitherto unrecognised, equally-pathogenic HeV variant.



#### **James Gilkerson**

James Gilkerson is an internationally recognised expert in veterinary virology and microbiology. Professor Gilkerson is a graduate of the University of Sydney and has been a faculty member at the Melbourne Veterinary School since 2002. Professor Gilkerson's research is predominantly in the area of host-pathogen interaction and the epidemiology of infectious disease, with a focus on equine infectious diseases.
